OVER \$16,500 AWARDED TO CONSERVATION DISTRICTS TO PROMOTE CONSERVATION IN PA

(Harrisburg) - Pennsylvania's county conservation districts were awarded \$16,830 for projects in eight counties for the 2022-23 Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) Mini-Grants. Conservation districts will use these grants to work with landowners to prevent pollution in our streams, lakes, and rivers. Projects will take place over the next nine months.

"CREP can be an important tool to help landowners financially while ensuring enough clean water and healthy soil for future generations. With this funding, conservation districts will be able to meet with landowners to see if CREP is right for them," said Brenda Shambaugh, Executive Director for the Pennsylvania Association of Conservation Districts (PACD).

The following conservation districts were awarded up to \$3,000 as part of the 2022-23 CREP mini-grant round:
