## Blair County School's Bioblitz Event Supported by PA DEP EE Grant





In late November, the Tyrone School campus hosted an educational Bioblitz event, made possible through generous funding from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection's (PA DEP) Environmental Education grant. The event, which brought together students, teachers, and environmental experts, aimed to foster an appreciation for biodiversity and environmental stewardship among the participants.

## **An Immersive Learning Experience**

The Bioblitz began with a welcome and introduction to the concept of a Bioblitz, where students learned about the importance of biodiversity and the day's objectives.

Following the initial briefing, students were divided into teams and equipped with tools for exploration, including collection buckets, thermometers and microscopes for gathering and analyzing samples. The bioblitz was structured to emphasize teamwork, environmental respect, and the significance of scientific inquiry. Students were encouraged to work collaboratively, fostering a sense of community and shared learning.



## **Inspiring Future Environmental Stewards**

As the day concluded, there was an evident sense of excitement and accomplishment among the students. The Bioblitz not only broadened their understanding of local ecosystems but also instilled a sense of responsibility to protect and cherish the environment.
