Connecting Soils and Profits: Tools for Improving Soil Health 2018 Event Featured Speakers



Ray Archuleta is a Certified Professional Soil Scientist with the Soil Science Society of America and has over 30 year's experience as a Soil Conservationist, Water Quality Specialist, and Conservation Agronomist with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

Ray received his AS degree in Livestock Science from Northern New Mexico College and a BS degree in Agricultural Biology plus 30 hours of graduate work in soil related courses from New Mexico State University. He served in the Peace Corps for two years in Guatemala as a Livestock Specialist.

After his retirement from the NRCS in 2017, Ray founded Soil Health Consulting, LLC and Soil Health Academy, LLC to teach agroecology principles for improving soil function on a national scale. Ray also owns and operates a 150-acre farm near Seymour, Missouri that he operates along with his wife and family.

Steve Groff is a passionate advocate for cover crops and building soil health. He and his family, farm 305 acres of cash grain crops, pumpkins and heirloom tomatoes in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. For the past 22 years, his Cedar Meadow Farm has conducted thousands of cover crop research trials, out of which he developed the well-known Tillage Radish. Steve is the founder of Cover Crop Coaching & he is a contributing columnist for the American Agriculturalist magazine and the Lancaster Farming- writing articles on the use of cover crops.





Dr. John Tooker has been a Penn State University faculty member since 2008. He is an advocate of integrated pest management (IPM) and building natural predator populations to control pest insects in crop fields. His research topics include key limitations of neonicotinoid seed treatments, slug management and ecological controls, in-field habitat management to optimize pest control, and developing ecological pest management systems.



Dave McLaughlin and his son, Cole, operate a 135 cow dairy and crop 550 acres in Elliottsburg, Perry County. Dave has over 30 years of experience using no-till and cover crops. Starting in 1999, he has been using no-till on 100% of his acres and since 2013, he has been using cover crops on every acre. Dave feels that the combination of his use of no-till, cover crops and the manure from the dairy are the keys to advancing soil health on their operation.
